"Microsoft Office, which was renamed Microsoft 365 a while ago, is about to undergo drastic visual changes. Everything from fonts to colors to even line weights are getting new default settings. The changes are intended to make documents created with Microsoft 365 look more modern and accessible. Microsoft is not yet disclosing when all Microsoft 365 users will be swapped over to the new default theme." b) How Can Four Random Words Possibly Be More Secure Than 16 Random Characters? by Leo A. Notenboom. "Passphrases are better. There are as many, or more, combinations of four or five random words as there are 16 random characters. Given that they can be just as secure and significantly easier to remember, passphrases can be a useful approach to password-based security." The article goes into great detail comparing passwords and passphrases. And if you use "simple variations like capitalization and spacing — 'Correct Horse Battery Staple' — the number of possible passphrases resulting from the various combinations of words explodes. Every word takes on multiple variants depending on length and capitalization, and every passphrase takes on even more possibilities as we vary the characters separating the words." Consider using passphrases instead of passwords. Read the article to learn more about using passphrases (cont)

Comments from Ross--Passwords and Communication: This past week I have had to deal with two people who have either passed away or were incapacitated in the ICU. I was asked by their family to help log into their phones and computers but unfortunately there was no log of user names and passwords. In the case of one person who had Apple products, my only option was to erase the phone if I didn't have the password. In the other case, I was able to access the computer but unable to gain access to an important Point-of-Sale software which held the information needed to help run the business that was left by the deceased. The main point of this article being to either have your user names and passwords in a password-keeping software like LastPass and then give your main password to one trusted person or to keep your info in a binder or logbook and then tell a trusted person where to find that book in the event of an emergency. Having access to this important information after a loved one has passed or is otherwise unable to communicate, will save a lot of time and headache.

Editor's Note: What is also helpful in these situations is to have a list of your bills with account numbers and how they are paid. i.e. PG&E, acct number and how you pay it: check, credit or debit card (list card number) and if it's on AUTOPAY.
