07.18.2024. "Microsoft is about to make a significant change to how it delivers security updates and new features for Windows 11. You can still expect to see a single update package on the second Tuesday of each month (aka Patch Tuesday), but instead of a single (cont) d) update file that grows larger every month, Microsoft is introducing what it calls 'checkpoint cumulative updates.' Under the new delivery system... Microsoft might periodically release cumulative updates as checkpoints.The new system won't be publicly available until the end of the year, as part of Windows 11, version 24H2... here are four things you need to know about the new update format. 1- Checkpoint updates should be smaller and easier to manage 2-The new update packages are only available to beta testers today 3-You probably won't notice the change 4-This won't affect Windows 10 users at all zdnet.com/microsoft-ischanging-how-it-deliverswindows-updates-4things-you-need-to-know

First up is the blocking of the file download. The only options at this point are to delete the download from the history and to click on a help link. Deleting the download from history removes it from the system. Whether this new barrier to downloading dangerous files will reduce the number of malicious downloads remains to be seen."
