c) Al Isn't Really Artificial Intelligence by Andrew Heinzman, 01.27.2023. "At its core, today's AI is incapable of comprehension, knowledge, thought, or 'intelligence.' This name is little more than a marketing gimmick. It cannot 'know' or 'think' anything. Existing AI is just a mess of code attached to a big pile of data, which it remixes and regurgitates. You can ask ChatGPT to write you a resume, and it'll spit out something based on the resumes in its dataset (plus whatever info you share). This is useful, it automates labor, but it's not a sign of intelligence... today's hot topic is AI writing and art. And both of these applications require a huge amount of human labor. As we saw with CNET's little AI journalism experiment, AI can't be expected to do a good job without constant oversight from humans...(cont)

- d) This AI can spoof your voice after just three seconds by Alex Blake, 01.10.2023. "Microsoft is working on an AI that can imitate anyone's voice after being fed a short three-second sample. The new tool, dubbed VALL-E, has been trained on roughly 60,000 hours of voice data in the English language, which Microsoft says is 'hundreds of times larger than existing systems'. Using that knowledge, its creators claim it only needs a small
- d) smattering of vocal input to understand how to replicate a user's voice." To mitigate the threat of potential risks of "misuse", "Microsoft says 'it is possible to build a detection model to discriminate whether an audio clip was synthesized by VALL-E.' Comments from Ross--Spell Check Quick Tip: I often see people struggling to correct typos in their email and documents. There is a simple step to correct typos. Let's look at this sample:

See the red line under the words Nowe and teme? If

you right click on each word, you will be given a choice of word or words to choose from and by simply clicking the word you want, the typo is fixed. Here are examples of what you would see when right clicking the misspelled words:
