Using the right terminology is important to being understood and getting your problems resolved. And just like when you go to the doctor or take your car to a mechanic, it's important that you be able to communicate clearly what you want them to look at. If you're just using technology and never need to interact with a technician or anyone else about it, it doesn't matter what you call things. The problems arrive when you're trying to communicate with technical professionals such as myself. This is especially true when asking for help or guidance. We need to know what you're talking about in order to give you the help you're asking for." He gives a few examples: "This box is not a CPU. RAM/Memory and disk space are two very different things. Your screen is not your computer." And it

e) Will Backing Up My Computer Back Up My. Email? by Leo A Notenboom. "To back up e) your email, you first have to figure out where it lives. It might be on your computer, or it might be on the internet. Backing up your email depends on where your email is stored. If you use an email program like Microsoft Office's Outlook (not Outlook.com — that's a website), Thunderbird, or many others, the email they access is downloaded to your computer." If the email program is storing your email in a folder that gets backed up, then yes, "the email is probably getting backed up. If you access your email using a web browser like Edge, Firefox, or Chrome to visit websites like outlook.com. gmail.com, or mail.yahoo.com, your email is not stored on your computer ...the email remains on their servers, not your PC. It's important to know how your email is handled and where it lives. Only then can you be

sure it's getting backed up."

Comments from Ross--Email programs simplified:

There are several ways to check your email with two of the most popular applications being Outlook and Thunderbird. I can't recommend Thunderbird anymore because they update it too often causing it to act and look different too often. Outlook(not outlook.com) is a good program but in the past was too expensive to buy and overly complicated for the casual user. A simplified way to check email is through your internet provider's or email provider's website. For example, if Xfinity is your internet provider (or email ends @comcast.net), open a browser (Chrome, Firefox, Brave, etc) and type in xfinity.com and sign in. For Sonic users, type in webmail.sonic.net. If your email ends with @hotmail.com or @gmail.com, use your browser and type hotmail.com/gmail.com and sign in. The take away here is you don't need a special program installed on your computer or laptop to check email. Open a browser and find your internet provider's or email provider's webpage. And the biggest bonus of using your internet provider's or email provider's website is that all of your email is automatically backed up.
