- a) Is a Passkey Two-Factor Authentication? by Leo A. Notenboom. "Using passkeys can kinda sorta feel like two-factor authentication, but they aren't. Not really. That's important to understand, so you'll have the level of security you want and expect. Passkeys enhance security but are not twofactor authentication (2FA). They replace passwords. Two-factor authentication consists of something you know, like your password, and something you have, like your mobile phone or other 2FA device. The added security? Since hackers don't have access to your second factor, they can't make it past that first step even if they know your password. Passkeys are tokens securely placed and kept on your device that indicate you are authorized to access a certain site. They're secured by the security of your device. The bottom line here is that you're unlocking the device, not the account. The device, then, contains the passkey confirming you're authorized to access the

For \$30, you'll receive 'critical' and 'important' security updates basically security patches that will continue to protect your Windows 10 PC from any vulnerabilities. That \$30 is for one year's worth of updates.." This option should be available closer to the end-of-support date of October 14, 2025. Voice Typing is just for dictating text into documents and other text boxes. Voice Access lets you control your PC — and it lets you dictate text, too. Voice Access is a newer feature, and it works offline; Voice Typing requires an internet connection. Windows 10 has Windows Dictation. This is an older version of Voice Typing. Like the version in Windows 11, Windows Dictation requires an internet connection to function. if you use Microsoft Word via a Microsoft 365 subscription, you'll have a Dictate feature built into Word. This uses technology similar to Voice
