d) Facebook gets round tracking privacy measure by encrypting links by Christopher Boyd, 07.20.2022. "A form of individual tracking specific to your web browser is at the heart of a currently contested privacy battle, and one which Facebook has just got the upper hand to. Sites make use of the added parameters in order to track your clicks across a range of sites or services, an activity which can be monetised for marketing or analytics. A company may also be able to know where you visit away from their own website. The marketing possibilities are endless,

d) and so too are the privacy implications." Read the article to find out how Facebook has switched to "encryption for its parameter tracking needs. What this means is that the encrypted part of the URL is essentially part of the whole URL. If you remove it, you won't be directed to the specific page you're looking for." e) How to use confidential mode in Gmail to protect sensitive information by Jack Wallen, 08.26.2022.

"A few years back Google

e) did add a nice feature to **Gmail called Confidential** Mode that helps protect sensitive information... With Confidential Mode, you can set an expiration date and a password for messages and even revoke access any time you choose. And when a recipient receives a confidential message, they cannot forward, copy, print, or download the message. The one caveat to Confidential Mode is that there's no way of stopping users from taking screenshots of those confidential emails..." If you have to email confidential information and use gmail, this is the article for you. zdnet.com/article/how-touse-confidential-mode-inComputer user tips: 1. Don't start clicking buttons when something goes wrong. This happens more often than I like to hear. If your computer starts acting strange, it's not a good idea to start clicking around the page trying to fix it. This can make things worse. Call someone who knows something about computers. 2. Check links before you click on them. Don't assume a link that a friend sent you is legitimate-first hover your cursor over the link, DON'T CLICK the link. Is the link going to where you think it's going? For example, you get a link to an amazon page but when you hover over the link, it says www.anason.eu.xyz.com. ls that Amazon? 3. Don't panic if something goes haywire-panic leads to button clicking. Call a professional. 4. Don't install random applications or browser extensions--grandkids like to do this when they use grandma's computer. 5. Be organized. When you create files or download files from emails or the internet, put them in the appropriate folder, for example, pictures goes into the Pictures folder, and that Word document should be saved in the Documents folder. Saving files in random places makes it harder to do a good backup. Stick to the standard Windows folders: Documents, Downloads, Pictures, Music and Videos
